MEETING OF WESTERN AUSTRALIAN SYNOD



The Western Australian Synod held its Annual General Meeting on 23 October 2021 at St Andrew's Church in Lesmurdie. Once again, thanks to Zoom and the expertise of Subdeacon Keith O'Brien, the Bishop was able to preside at the Synod. The most important item on the agenda was a Bill for an Ordinance to replace the existing *Parochial Ordinance* which has been amended many times since it was enacted in 2000.

The Bill was passed unanimously and has received Episcopal assent. As the Ordinance regulates Parishes and Provisional Parishes, all those who serve on a Parish Council should familiarize themselves with its provisions. A copy is available from Parish Secretaries.

+ VALE DES WRIGHT AOM +



Desborough Wright, who was born on 5 July 1932, met Edna Rook in 1956 through membership of the Student Christian Movement when they were both training to be teachers at Kestevan College in Lincolnshire, England.

In 1960 they married in East Finchley, London, and went to teach in Banbury, Oxfordshire, where their daughter, Carolyn, was born. There followed a series of moves to a school for

delinquent boys in Shropshire, followed by a five-year spell in Uganda helping that newly independent country develop its education system. Des loved living and working in Uganda where their daughter, Diane, was born, and the years there produced some of their best and happiest memories.

After a brief sojourn in England, Des was employed by the WA Education Department and the family migrated to Western Australia in 1970.

They settled in Hamersley with their two young daughters and attended the Central Methodist church in Perth. Des taught in John Forrest Senior High School and after several years moved to the Distance Education Centre in West Perth where he remained until his retirement in 1993.

The Wrights had left the Methodist church in the early Eighties and attended St George's Cathedral in Perth where they were fortunate enough to meet the Dean, the Very Revd David Robarts. That Des was held in high regard by Bishop David is evidenced by the fact that on one of his visits to Perth he speicifally requested to be taken to visit Des and Edna.

Their two daughters attended St Mary's Anglican School in Karrinyup and Des became Chairman of the Parents' Society and Member of the Board of Governors. They were firmly in the Anglican fold until the advent of women's ordination in the early Nineties. This was against their principles and they left the Anglican Church and became members of the Anglican Catholic Church in Australia as parishioners at St Ninian's Church in Maylands. Des became the Parish Secretary, Member of the Management Committee and, in 1993, was appointed the Bishop's Commissary and Chairman of the State Synod.

Because of unrest within the congregation and the dismissal of the parish priest they decided to worship at St Andrew's at Falls Farm. Des continued as Chairman of Synod but eventually resigned for health reasons in 1996.

With the children married and age creeping on they moved, in 2000, to Cambrai Village, a retirement estate owned by the Royal Australian Air Force Association in

Merriwa north of Joondalup. As a consequence they had to leave St Andrew's as the weekly commute was too far to sustain.

They accepted the challenge of developing the new village establishing a communal library and participating in the work of various committees including the establishment of the inter-denominational village chapel. Des established the Cambrai Commemorations Committee to ensure that the quasi-military interests and commemorative traditions of the RAAF Association were properly serviced in what is a Veterans' Memorial Estate. For service to veterans and to the community of Mindarie through initiatives supporting the preservation of military history, he was awarded the Order of Australia Medal in 2007.

The fact that the street names in Cambrai Village commemorate Victoria Cross recipients of the Great War was an incentive to Des to write *Streets of valour: the Victoria Cross heroes of Cambrai Village* which was published in 2014. The purpose of the work is to honour the nineteen Victoria Cross holders featured in it and to make their stories available to present and future residents of the Village and the wider community.

By this time Edna was suffering from dementia and had been taken into fulltime care and by 2017 Des's physical health had declined to the point where he also had to go into care. He moved into Vivian Bullwinkel Lodge and was only a couple of rooms away from Edna.

Fr Brian kept in touch with Des and Edna and he and Miems visited them as often as possible.

Edna fell asleep in Jesus on 12 May 2020 followed by Des on 8 October 2021.

At Des's funeral service Fr Brian said that something that struck him about Des was that he was a man of deep faith who loved his Lord. He was steadfast and immovable in his faith, he abounded in the work of His Lord, and knew that his labour was not in vain [1 Cor 15:58].



PEACE ON EARTH, GOODWILL TOWARDS MEN.

This, we may say, is the hope that every Christmas brings. But where, this Christmas, shall we find it? Around us we see violence, greed, and exploitation on earth; enmity and ill-will within, dividing us. Why then, people ask, do we go on repeating this pious but empty hope, year after year. There is always war, inequality, and the conflicts of self-interest, to grind us down and take the heart out of our attempts at peace and goodwill.

Why then, do we continue to do so? Because God also found it this way 2000 years ago. While inconceivable to us, He was conceived as one of us; He drew breath to breathe new life into our humanity, renewing us with His Divine Heart, we might say. Through Him, God enters the painful conflicts of our human condition. And He comes to us as an unwanted outsider, born amongst animals in a stable.

Then as now, the world was an uninviting place, but God did not wait for an invitation. He just gave Himself to us and for us, as he continues to do, because it is His Way. Utterly beyond our comprehension, we matter to God. It seems that despite, or perhaps because of, our suffering, He looks beyond frailties and failures to what He can make of us. And herein lies our Christmas and our ultimate hope.

God's Christmas present is Jesus Christ: He is our Peace on Earth and Goodwill towards Men. Yet He is easily overlooked, even as He was in that unlikely birth at Bethlehem. Amongst glossy and brightly packaged seasonal goods He may seem at first sight so ordinary, even insignificant. Even so, He wants us to take Him into our lives and homes; to keep giving to us when our giving is spent, unwrapping Peace and Goodwill in our hearts when our peace has evaporated, and our goodwill has dried up, long since. For Jesus Christ is the Gift, the Giving, that lies at the heart of the world. He is the hope that Christmas always brings. Take new heart in His Divine Heart for you: Peace and Goodwill will overflow. ORTHODOX HYMN FOR THE FEAST OF CHRISTMAS.

What shall we offer thee, O Christ, who for our sakes hast appeared on earth as man?

Every creature made by thee offers thee thanks,

The angels offer thee a hymn; the heavens a star;

The Magi, gifts; the shepherds, their wonder;

The earth, a cave; the wilderness a manger;

And we offer thee a Virgin Mother.

God before all ages, have mercy upon us.

HAMPERS BRING JOY TO THE HILLS

Both parishes again supported *Sharing a Hills Christmas*, now in its twentyeighth year, a combined effort of fifteen churches and fourteen schools in the Hills area to lift the spirits of locals in need at Christmas-time.

Planning begins in September and all donated food and gifts are taken to the Kalamunda Church of Christ, which co-ordinates the drive, where they are sorted, packed, wrapped and finally delivered just before Christmas.

This year volunteers dropped off more than 300 hampers and 265 seniors' gift bags around the City of Kalamunda in the course of two days. The hampers were arranged so that every person in a household would receive a gift and it is estimated that about 1300 people in the community would have received one. It is sad to think that, in the affluent society in which we live, the presents some children receive are the only ones they will get at Christmas.

It is hoped that the hampers would take the stress off families who had struggled through a difficult year.

LENT AND FASTING

Ent is a season of soul-searching and repentance. It is a season for reflection and taking stock. It originated in the very earliest days of the Church as a preparatory time for Easter, when the faithful rededicated themselves, and when converts were instructed in the faith and prepared for baptism. By observing the forty days of Lent, we imitate Jesus' withdrawal into the wilderness for forty days. He fasted for forty days. If we are truly to imitate Jesus, then we should fast too.

It is an ancient custom of the Church to fast during Lent. It is important to note that fasting is a spiritual discipline that does not involve starvation or dehydration. It has been customary to fast by abstaining from meat which is why, in some parts of the world, the season is called *carnival*, which literally means "farewell to meat".

Fasting is like prayer: Jesus expects it of us. It is part of the discipline of Lent, just as almsgiving is. In the Gospel for Ash Wednesday, we hear Jesus say, "when you give to the needy", "when you pray", and "when you fast". He doesn't say, "if you give to the needy", "if you pray", or "if you fast": these are things He expects of us.

The ancient rules of the church are still followed by many, particularly in the Eastern Church. During the whole of Lent no meat is eaten, nor animal products, such as eggs, milk, butter and cheese, and fish is allowed only on certain days.

In Lent we have days of fasting, and days of abstinence. *Abstinence* implies refraining from flesh meat; *fasting* implies limiting the amount of food taken. In modern practice fasting means having one full meal, (but not before midday), and two small meals during the day. All days during Lent are fast days, except Sundays, because on Sundays we celebrate the resurrection of Christ, and Ash Wednesday and all Fridays are days of abstinence *and* fasting.

A fast is a personal act of devotion to God; it is a *disciplined* diet, not a total abstention from food. During a religious fast, we still eat, but we abstain from certain foodstuffs and, traditionally, people have fasted by eliminating luxury items from their diets. Some people fast by eating whatever they like, but only drink water.

There are different levels of fasting, ranging from just abstaining from meat, to abstaining from all food and beverages except bread, water, juices, honey and nuts. The last would describe the diet of John the Baptist and may very well have been the fast that Jesus undertook.

On days of abstinence, it is permissible to eat fish. A simple, perhaps too simple explanation for this, is that the Flood meant to punish mankind for its sins, but as all fish survived, it was clear that they were free of sin.


To fast personally, just omit an item or two from your diet – something you would normally eat or drink during the course of the day. Every time you feel like having the item, you will be reminded of your fast and, what is important, the reason for your fast, and you can say a prayer instead of eating or drinking. This is only something small, but it can have immense spiritual benefit.

Fasting helps us to see ourselves as we really are in relation to God and others and what needs to be changed in our hearts. It clarifies our desires and shows us that we don't really need all the things we think we need. Also, we are prompted to share those things with the needy.

Just as he tempted Jesus, Satan tempts us with hunger, pride and a lust for power, to turn away from God. We know that with God's help we can overcome personal temptation. This is the reason we enter into the Forty Days of Lent. We enter the wilderness with Jesus, not only knowing that we will be tested, but also assured that He has gone before us, He walks with us, and He has guaranteed the outcome: at the end of Lent come Resurrection and victory over evil.

Jesus fasted forty days and forty nights to prepare for His ministry. When was the last time any of us skipped lunch to spend the time with God?
